Unexpected Changes

I graduated from the University of Florida in May. I was planning to move to Jackson, Mississippi for an Industrial Engineering internship in nuclear power. Unfortunately, as a result of company cutbacks, the intern positions were cut.

As a result, I am currently living in Gainesville and working a few part-time jobs. I work at a learning center, tutoring high school students, in SAT preparation and subject tutoring. I am also doing after-school tutoring with elementary school students. I am happy to be in Gainesville, I really believe this is where God wants me.

Substitute teaching and tutoring have taught me a lot about the education system in this country and given me exposure to different types of classrooms and various grade levels. My tutoring jobs have given me even more opportunity to teach. I have enjoyed being apart of the education process and have tried to not only teach children math and reading, but also instill confidence in them and encourage them. I only have a limited amount of time with each child, but I feel that God is using the time that I have with them to positively influence at least some of their lives. I plan to stay in Gainesville until June of next year and plan to continue both tutoring and substitute teaching until then.

Answered Prayers

Towards the end of 2008 the college ministry at my church, First Assembly of God, began to get involved in raising awareness and money for Hananasif Orphanage. This has been an answer to my prayers. Upon returning to the US from my time at Hananasif, I wanted to find ways to raise money for the orphanage and specifically people who would be excited about supporting Hananasif and their cause. I have gotten even more involved in the college ministry this year and have been able to help facilitate a growing relationship between First Assembly and Hananasif. It has been encouraging to see college students here in Gainesville get excited about Hananasif and helping these children and students in Tanzania.





Return to Tanzania

One way I am facilitating this relationship between the church and Hananasif is by helping lead a trip to take some of these college students to Tanzania to spend two weeks at the orphanage. The trip will take place in June 2010 and will cost me \$2.500.

I remember the feeling I had over a year ago as I sat in the back seat of a taxi on my way to the airport when I was leaving Tanzania. I knew my time there was not done, that I would be back. It will be exciting to see how God uses our group and this trip. The group will be participating in some infrastructure projects at Hananasif Academy and in educational work with the children and students.
